Are there any advantages to hearing loss?

A Short answer is yes, but they are some-

times hard to recognize. Some of the more obvious ones are, the discount on your bell phone bill and if you tell the airport staff you're hard of hearing, they will let you preboard in front of everyone else, and the very difficult to attain disability tax credit.

Some of the possibly lesser known advantages (well, lesser known to non-hearing aid wearers):

- · you can choose to not hear things by taking your hearing aids off.
- · deliberately not understand someone when they ask you for something.
- · the ability to make a joke about things like "why did you buy a new sheep for your bed? ohhhh you said sheets",
- · you can get things in writing from your lawyer or doctor that they wouldn't normally write.down because you can't understand them.

Many of you may remember Dr. Larry Roberts

Professor Emeritus, Department of Psychology, Neuroscience and Behaviour, McMaster University

Dr. Roberts was a leading scientist, professor, and researcher, who passed away in his 81<sup>st</sup> year in Kingston, Ontario, after a brief and sudden illness in July, 2019.

We had the pleasure of having Larry speak to our CHHA group a several times. He was a very approachable, pleasant and knowledgeable gentleman.

May we offer our belated sympathy to his family.

- · If you have new hearing aids with **Bluetooth** you can listen to music and no one can tell.
- · you get to listen to TV without interruption because you can't hear anyone that tries to interrupt you.
- · when you can go to the theatre, if they are looped or provide a listening system, you do not have to worry about the person beside you opening a loud bag of chips or candies.
- · a lot of people cannot stand the sound of someone chewing; we hearing aid wearers can just turn them off. Problem solved!

One of the main benefits is, you get to have conversations with people face to face and you are actively listening to them. Sure, it may be because if you didn't put your whole focus into listening you would not be able to understand the person you're talking to, but it is surprisingly rare to have a conversation where both participants are actually listening to each other.

Hearing loss can be immensely frustrating. It can lead to social isolation and depression. I hope pointing out some of these silver linings has helped you see a light in a situation that can sometimes be fairly dark. # Joan Miller has spent years advocating for the hard of hearing

#### 'We've come a long, long way,' says inaugural president of local branch of Canadian Hard of Hearing Association

Joan Miller, inaugural president of the Canadian **Hard** of **Hearing** Association's Hamilton and area branch, has not only been a dedicated volunteer through the years, but also a mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. - Tamara Botting/Torstar For a long time, many people thought hard of

For a long time, many people thought hard of hearing was synonymous with deaf.

It's a mentality Joan Miller struggled against for years. "We've come a long, long way," she said.

For a long time, government agencies in particular were under the impression that if they were helping people who were deaf, it would automatically benefit those who were hard of hearing, too. "We had to show them that we needed a different kind of help," Miller said.

The Caledonia resident has been hard of hearing most of her life; she had measles when she was about two years old, and the best guess is that's what caused it.

"I got through school OK by sitting at the front of the classroom," she said. However, "As I had my children, my hearing became progressively worse." She started wearing a hearing aid when she was 28.

After her first husband passed away, Miller was working in Hamilton at Mission Services when she spotted a notice in the Hamilton Spectator for a meeting for people who were hard of hearing.

"I was having a difficult time with my hearing, and I needed help," she said, so she went. " At the first meeting, there was a room full of people, and they had a woman signing at the front. None of us could understand it," Miller said.

Some good did come of that meeting, though; "I found out I wasn't the only person."

Miller and some others banded together and founded the Hamilton and area branch of the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association, with Miller as the group's inaugural president. "The group grew; at one time, we had about 230 members," she said.

As a member of the executive, Miller travelled cross-country, attending conferences and helping spread the word about hearing loss, advocacy and accessibility. "When you lose your hearing, it's very traumatic," she said.

In 2013, the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association created the Joan Miller Award of Merit.

Jacquie Reid, communications and newsletter editor for the Hamilton branch, said, "It is an award that goes to a long-standing member who has contributed outstanding service to the work of the association and the Hamilton and area branch."

Reid said that Miller "served many terms on our board, oversaw significant years of growth and strengthening of the organization. This award reflects (her) spirit of dedication."

Miller also served as a volunteer on Haldimand's accessibility committee and with the White Cane Club for the visually impaired; she also wrote a column, On the Seniors Scene, for The Sachem for many years, and is the author of three books.
